RIO TV AUDIENCE FIGURES RELEASED

A report commissioned by the *Association of Summer Olympic International Federations* have released the television audiences for the table tennis at the **Rio Olympic Games**, and the numbers are truly staggering.

The worldwide viewing audience for the table tennis events was **552,300,000**. *Five hundred and fifty-two million*. Obviously, **China** led the way with **372,000,000** followed by **Japan** with **27,800,000**. Surprisingly, the **U.S.A.** had **24,900,000**, host nation **Brazil** reached **23,100,000** and **India** had **22,000,000**. The figure for **Australia** was a very impressive **4,100,000**. The total for all European countries was **67,000,000**.

With multiple tables in action, the overall total of table tennis broadcast was **471.4 hours**. The predominant viewing age group was 30 - 49, with an almost equal split between men and women.

The figures are based on a viewer watching the sport for a minimum of **5** consecutive minutes. This was lucky, because with the coverage given by **Channel 7**, 5 consecutive minutes was about all we got.

MBE'S FOR ENGLISH PARALYMPIC CHAMPIONS

English Paralympic table tennis players **Will Bayley** (Class 7) and **Rob Davies** (Class 1) have both been awarded MBE's for their achievements of winning Gold medals at the Rio Paralympic Games.



Named in the New Year's Day honours list, Bayley said "I'm so delighted to be given an MBE. It is a huge honour and means so much to me. I'm proud every day to represent Great Britain and I feel privileged to have been able to represent my country in three Paralympic Games already".

Davies was just as impressed. "I feel absolutely ecstatic that I've been named in this year's honours list to receive an MBE. My face just lit up when I read the letter. I was just so overwhelmed and happy. I feel so privileged and proud and would just like to thank everybody who's been part of this amazing journey I've been on. I can't wait to make 2017 special!"



ITTF STAR AWARDS 2016

At the end of each year, the ITTF hold a star-studded function to honour the best players of the year. It's like our presentation night, but with glitter. The 2016 awards ceremony was held in **Doha, Qatar** in December, and the winners were:-

Other nominees were Sandra Paovic (Croatia) (Class 6) and Xue

The **Star Point Award** was won by Fan Zhendong (China) and **Simon Gauzy** (France) for their amazing 2-shot rally and their reactions to the rolling recovery played by Fan Zhendong.

But for me, the most deserving award on the night was the **Fair Play Award** given to **Rinad Fathy** of **Egypt**. In the Girl's Team Final of the African Junior & Cadet Championships, 15-year-old Fathy was playing in a singles match which was delicately poised at 2 games each.

Leading 12-11 in the fifth, Fathy was awarded the point to give her the win. She made in known that her opponent's shot had caught an edge which neither the umpire nor the assistant umpire had seen. Fathy lost that match, but her sporting spirit was rewarded when her team eventually won the championship for Egypt.

Although not given an award on the night, another Fair Play winner was **Tomas Polansky** of **Romania**. In a match at the World Junior Championships in Cape Town, South Africa, Polansky was trailing 2 games to 1, and leading 7-5 in the fourth. After a long rally, he was awarded the point to the cheers of his coach and teammates on the sidelines. However, Polansky advised the umpire that he had accidentally moved the table during the rally and that the point should be awarded to his opponent.

The Fair Play award is given by the *Swaythling Club International* to encourage fair play and sportsmanship, an act that may inspire others. The winner receives a **US\$1,500** scholarship cheque for career development donated by the International Table Tennis Federation.

WALDNER GETS SWEDISH GONG

Table tennis legend **Jan-Ove Waldner** received the Sports Academy's Honorary Award for lifetime achievement at the Annual Swedish Sports Gala held during January. The prize is awarded for a lasting contribution that has enriched Swedish sports.

Waldner's international career spanned three decades, winning Olympic gold in Barcelona in 1992, six World Championship gold medals and completing 212 months unbroken in the Top Ten of the Men's World Rankings; more than any other player in the history of the sport.

Television host **Kristin Kaspersen** spoke warmly when announcing the award winner. "I think I can speak for all of us when I say thank you for all the marvellous moments, and thanks for all the entertainment you gave us during your 45 years as a table tennis player."

Presenting the award was **Jean-Phillipe Gatien**, Waldner's opponent in the finals of the Barcelona Olympics, and fellow national teammate **Mikael Appelgren**. "I think you are the best athlete this country has seen." said Appelgren.



Waldner was humbled by the award as he reflected upon his career. "It is a great honour for me to receive this award. I want to thank my parents for having supported me in both good times and bad, and my brother who meant a lot to me. Without their help I would not have been here today".

RAIN RAIN GO AWAY

One of the most unusual incidents in table tennis occurred at the **1975** World Championships in **Calcutta**, **India**, when play was delayed due to rain. The roof of the stadium leaked and one of the courts was flooded. Records don't show if the **Duckworth-Lewis method** was used to recalculate the required score.

CHEERLEADING OLYMPIC-BOUND?

Did you hear that Cheerleading is being considered as an Olympic sport?

Give me a "**W**". Give me a "**T**". Give me an "**F**". Yep, you read it right. <u>W</u>hat <u>Tremendous <u>F</u>un. At least I think that's what it stands for.</u>

But seriously. Cheerleading? I mean, I thought they were stretching the bounds when they suggested surfing, but <u>Cheerleading?!?</u> And they don't even cheer while they're doing it.

For those of you not familiar with the activity, think of synchronized swimming without the water.

It's certainly physical. With a combination of dance and gymnastics, a workout is guaranteed, but its claim of being a sport is still in question. While the athletic talents of participants is never in question, critics of its inclusion say that the scoring is based on human judgement rather than an objective or goal, in the same fashion as ballroom dancing and surfing. The same can be said, however, of gymnastics, diving, figure-skating, and other Olympic activities.

Even in legal terms its status is not clearly defined. A 2009 verdict in the state of Wisconsin declared cheerleading a "full-contact" sport, which meant that participants and organisers could not be sued for accidental injury. 18 months later, the U.S. federal court declared that, because of a lack of program development and organisation, it was **not** a sport.

Lack of organisation? It seems to be the most over-organised activity going around. In the U.S., competitions are organised and run by Americheer, the International Cheer Union, the International Federation of Cheerleading, the National Cheerleading Association, the United Spirit Association, and the Universal Cheerleaders Association.

The American medical journal *Pediatrics* revealed that the number of cheerleaders suffering broken bones, concussions and serious sprains increased by over **100**% between 1990 and 2002, and that in 2001 alone there were <u>over **25,000**</u> hospital visits for cheerleading accidents with shoulder, ankle, head and neck injuries.

In the United States high school system, cheerleaders make up **3**% of the female athletes, but account for **65**% of all catastrophic injuries.

According to the *Australian Institute of Health and Welfare*, the serious injury rate in table tennis is **less than 6 per 100,000 participants**.

So... Give me a "T". Give me an "A". Give me a "B". Give me an....... ah, forget it. Let's just go and play.

A PARADOX TO START THE YEAR

Ever heard of the Birthday Paradox? It's a mathematical Probability problem, and a very interesting one at that. It tries to answer the question, "How many people do you need in a group to ensure that at least 2 share the same birthday?"

Well that's easy. There are 365 days in a year, so you would need 366 people, right?

What if I told you that if you had a group of **100** people, the odds of having 2 with the same birthday is **99.99997%**? Or better still, if I said that with a group of just **50** people, there was a **97%** chance?

Can we prove this? Well, our club is a group of around these numbers, and lo and behold, it works. On the 4^{th} of February Craig Archman and Lawrence Wu share the same birthday. To add to the complexity, they were born on the same day in the same year. My theory is that they were twins separated at birth. What do you think?

But can we take this paradox further? You betcha. Let's take the top 50 Men and top 50 Women table tennis players. We'll look at them separately to ensure we've got 2 groups of 50, rather than 1 group of 100.

Do we have players sharing a birthday? Yes, we do. And typical of table tennis players, they don't do things by half.

In the Men's, January 16th sees **Paul Drinkhall** from England (ranked 40th) sharing his birthday with **Robert Gardos** from Austria (ranked 43rd). Korean teammates **Jeoung Youngsik** (10th) and **Joo Saehyuk** (15th) share a birthday on January 20th, and **Wong Chun-Ting** (7th) from Hong Kong and **Matias Karlsson** (29th) from Sweden both celebrate on the 7th of September. Wong and Karlsson were both born in 1991 as well.

So that's 3 pairs of players sharing the same birthday. Wow. Can any group beat that? Interestingly enough, yes they can.

Amongst the top 50 Women players, **Georgina Pota** (34th) from Hungary and **Daniela Dodean** (44th) from Romania share a birthday on the 13th of January. On the 15th of February, **Cheng I-Ching** (6th) from Chinese Taipei and **Yang Haeun** (26th) from Korea get to blow out the candles together.

On the 14th of April Japanese teammates **Miu Hirano** (9th) and **Miyu Kato** (32nd) share the day, and on the very next day **Elizabeta Samara** (20th) from Romania and **Choi Hyojoo** (37th) from Korea share their birthday. Rounding out the extreme coincidences, on the 31st of August **Feng Tianwei** (5th) from Singapore and **Polina Mikhailova** (42nd) from Russia share the same birthday.

5 pairs from the top 50 women.

So we already know that the 97% chance of having 2 people out of 50 sharing their birthday has been blown apart, but it gets even stranger when you combine the Men and Women into a group of 100.

As well as the pairings listed above, we need to add **Yang Xiaoxin** (45th) from Monaco and **Xu Xin** (3rd) from China sharing the day on the 8th of January, **Liu Jia** (17th) from Austria and **Zhang Jike** (4th) from China sharing on the 16th of February, and **Vladimir Samsonov** (8th) from Belarus and **Sakura Mori** (37th) from Japan sharing on the 17th of April.

In a final bizarre twist, **Bojan Tokic** (43rd) from Slovakia was born on the 13th of January; the same day as Georgina Pota and Daniela Dodean as mentioned above.

So, the odds told us that there was a **99.9997%** chance of having 2 out of 100 people sharing the same birthday. But what are the odds of having *10 groups of 2* and a group of 3 sharing birthdays? Four supercomputers have been fried trying to calculate this.

As with so many other things, table tennis players have excelled. And this time no training was needed.

CHINESE-AUSTRIAN, CHINESE-GERMAN, CHINESE-TURKISH, CHINESE-.......

When looking at the list of the top 50 players in the Men's and Women's rankings, an interesting fact popped up. There are **5** men representing **China** in the top 50, and **4** women representing China in their top 50.

Dig a little deeper and you discover that of that group of 100 players, <u>29</u> of them were born in China. 20 of these have left their homeland and now play for their adopted countries.

FEBRUARY TOURNAMENTS

February is book-ended with tournaments. The big one at the start of the month is the **Australian Para Championships** which are being held at **Mornington** from the **3**rd to the **7**th of February. This is a *national championship* and will see the best para players from around the country competing, including Rio Silver medallist **Sam Von Einem**.

Of more interest to us, **Will Corluka** will be competing at his first national championship. Get along and show some support for our club-mate.

At the other end of the month, Saturday the **25**th sees the running of the **Victorian Closed Veterans Championship** at **MSAC**, and the following day the same venue will hold the **Victorian Closed Junior Championship**.

ON THE WEB

Have you visited the ITTF website lately? It's been re-written and is very different. It's still the same location, www.ittf.com but the clunky feel of the old site has been replaced with a slick new look. News items which used to be hard to find and even harder to read on the old site are now front and centre in a much clearer format. And articles from development and para have now been included into the main body of articles.

The **ITTV** streaming service has been relocated to this page as well. Although it works well for viewing on PC's, I have heard reports of problems when viewing using Playstation systems. Thankfully, the old page still exists and the Playstation viewer works well through that.
